Let us take time for all things; Make us to grow calm, serene, gentle.


Teach us to put into action our better impulses, straight-forward and unafraid.




That appearance lead to even more publicity for the club and additional coverage by the local TV station because our event was so interesting.

Empowerment – the process of becoming stronger and more confident, or as in my case, growing up in the military.

In 1971 I turned 18 in February, graduated high school in May, enlisted in July, and then headed for Basic Training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas for six weeks. For a naïve

teenager who had never flown or who had never been 1,300 miles away from home, amazingly I was not afraid. Basic Training Instructors (TI) had a lot of the girls in tears, but they did not have an authoritarian father like mine. I loved Basic! My father empowered me.

Others were not so lucky. I found out several of the women had joined because they needed a job and had signed over custody of their children to their parents in order to enlist. Pregnant women had to be discharged, so there were a lot of back alley abortions.

After Basic Training I went to Administrative Specialist Technical School at Keesler AFB in Biloxi, Mississippi. Since I had taken business courses in school, I finished the 12-week course in 7. In October, a week before I graduated, I met my husband Bill. We knew each other 3 days before we became engaged.

My first duty station was Randolph AFB in San Antonio, Texas. When I processed in the personnel specialist told me I would be assigned to the Supply Squadron and my supervisor, Ruby Dail, was extremely difficult to work for. I was determined to win her over. When I reported in, I was pleasantly surprised to find a short little old lady who was the best supervisor I ever had. **She empowered me.**

It was funny when I went to a files class which was all women and one man. He told us how intimidated he felt being the only man. We told him we knew exactly how he felt. In those days, the female dorm was called the bay of pigs — it was very much a man's world and you had to be careful on duty and off duty.

In December I flew home to get married but we had to wait until May 1972 when Bill graduated from Technical School to be stationed together at McConnell AFB in Wichita, Kansas. I was again stationed in the Supply Squadron but in Fuels (trucks that gas up the planes). The old Chief Master Sergeant in charge did not want a woman distracting his drivers. I eventually won him over when I proved I could do a good job. I felt empowered.

We were moved to Davis Monthan AFB in Tucson, Arizona and I was assigned to supervise the Security Police Squadron Orderly Room. Unfortunately, one of the airmen refused to be supervised by a woman and I had to discharge him. It was one of the hardest things I ever had to do. My position empowered me to do a job that had to be done.

Our next move brought us home to Ohio at Rickenbacker AFB where I was assigned to the Logistics Office. I had an uncomfortable experience with an out of state inspector who thought I was the entertainment after hours – Bill was out of town and I had volunteered to go to dinner with him. I had to explain to him it was only dinner. It was empowering to stand my ground.

Our next assignment was to Ramstein AB in Germany. I was assigned to the Noncommissioned Officer Academy (NCOA) office in Landstuhl. My favorite job. The Commandant was very inclusive and allowed me to be the master of ceremonies for a class graduation, which normally was performed by the instructors, an empowering experience.

Changes were being made in the Air Force – women could now stay in if they became pregnant. I became pregnant with my son at the same time as two of my staff. Since pregnancy uniforms were being designed, we wore civilian clothes.

In 1981 we were sent to England AFB in Alexandria, Louisiana for our last assignment before retirement. I was first assigned to an office in Personnel where I almost worked up to my due date with my daughter. I was able to breast feed for eight months and then I had to switch to formula because I was selected to attend the

NCOA at Barks-dale AFB in Shreveport, Louisi-ana. Since I had worked at the NCOA in Germany there was pressure for me to do well



and I graduated in the top ten percent. The Wing Senior Enlisted Advisor requested me as his assistant, empowering me to do something new, and I helped him with meetings, recognition luncheons and banquets, and retirement ceremonies. My second favorite job. The Wing Commander's office needed a replacement, and I was selected to fill the position.

With these two highly visible assignments, my husband was soon known as "Liz's husband" which led to problems with my marriage. I was sent to the Equipment Maintenance Squadron Orderly Room and worked with the senior NCOs and their wives' club – spouses automatically are cautious of female airmen. But they liked and accepted me.

I was promoted to Master Sergeant— There were not many women senior NCOs on the base. Several of the junior enlisted women I knew told me they could now see themselves as a senior NCO after seeing me promoted. I was able to empower others.

I was in Administration for 15 years before I was involuntarily crossedtrained into the Personnel career field due to shortages and was sent to the Personnel Readiness Unit.

I was close to retirement when I received notification that I would be going on a deployment to Honduras for four months. I prayed it would be canceled. The day I was getting on my flight, Dessert Storm hit. IF I had not gone on the deployment, I discovered I would have gone to Saudi Arabia for six months.

I retired after 20 years of service and credit the military for making me the person I am today - strong, confident and empowered for the next chapter in life!



To qualify she must meet two of the following criteria: 1) Competed in the Young Careerist or Individual Development Program; 2) Has taken an active role in membership growth at the local level; or 3) Has taken an active role in the education and/or passage of legislative issues directly related to the BPW/OH Legislative Platform.

WOMEN'S RETIREMENT FOUNDATION PRESIDENT, LORA MANON, Lancaster BPW

Ohio Business & Professional Women's Retirement Foundation will continue to award one \$500 grant per region to support a non-profit, low income / subsidized senior housing facility. This grant is for a facility that provides documentation that the entity is operating under a 501c3 and they are a government facility and/or non-profit low income/subsidized housing for seniors, this is not necessarily a nursing home. Each local in a region may submit a request; one local from each region will be chosen to receive the grant.
